2000 book

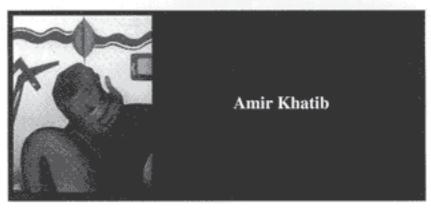

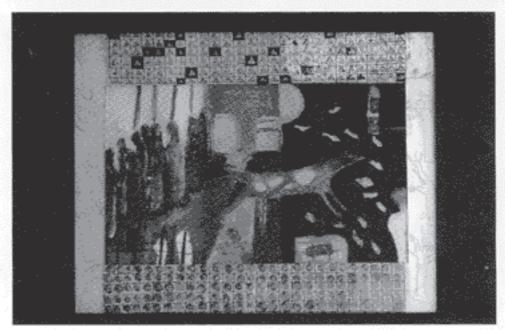

The artist of the issue Martina Cleary

Today, Martinas works seem to have left the struggles behind. A strong interest for the old Eastern cultures, especially Buddhism, has found its place in her art. The interest grew from the initial desire to do something else than work; she started to karate with a charismatic teacher who inspired a deeper interest in the Eastern philosophies and the desire to travel East. The mandala circle appeared later subconsciously, giving recent paintings their shape. A walk in the art world of Martina Cleary is a walk full of surprize - a young rebel in a strongly catholic, male-dominated society finds her female identity, pulls herself out of the compulsory issues of the day; gets on with painting for the sake of painting; dives into the collective subconscious and finds the expression of Buddhism and finds her way back to the divine comedy of the new-platonian Dante. Simultaneously she paints a kind of diary, where she deals with daily matters.



Before I left to Finland, I had in my mind a country of cold desert and isolation, almost empty of people and life. I was thinking of the arctic north of Greenland perhaps, and what I was looking for was the emptiness, an emptiness in which I could find my own form of expression. In Ireland I was constantly influenced by the social and political debate, which revolved around the struggle for female artists to find their voice, the political agenda, the issue of national identity... "To 'get through' as a female in Ireland you had to be very tough. I worked all the time, all my life was painting and the struggle to be taken seriously. One searched through popular and predominant culture to find reinforcement. This inevitably lead to questions and necessary actions to improve the situation. While writing my BA thesis at college for example, I found out the college library didn't have any substantial material on the female artists in which I was interested. This lead to my founding the first womens group on campus and a campaign of fund and issue raising. A new section was finally installed. By the end of my four years of study, I was exhausted with this ungoing agenda of sexuality before creativity.".

Martina came to Finland on a scholarshipin 1993. She met an environment where it was possible to concentrate on the material substance of painting itself. Light, shadow, space, colour, form and material were the issues at hand in the studios of the Kuvataideakatemia. It was also a meeting with a world where the women's voice was strong, and where she did not have to struggle with the necessity of extreme expressionto be heard..



The artist and teacher Silja Rantanen opened the world of space, which became the theoretical and aesthetic foundation of her two year study period, leading to her MFA in 1995. She travelled to Lapland during the kaamos -period, and deeply enjoyed the isolation and the emptiness of a landscape with little to intrude upon the mind or spirit. The work produced was a synthesis of colour, form and light gathered during the stay with an ever increasing interst in Eastern philosophy.

During her second year of study in Finland she also worked as an assistent of her teacher Tomi Mäkelä. Here she found the first teacher who spoke to her of painting as a medium onto itself, and the first male mentor to encourage her as an artist.

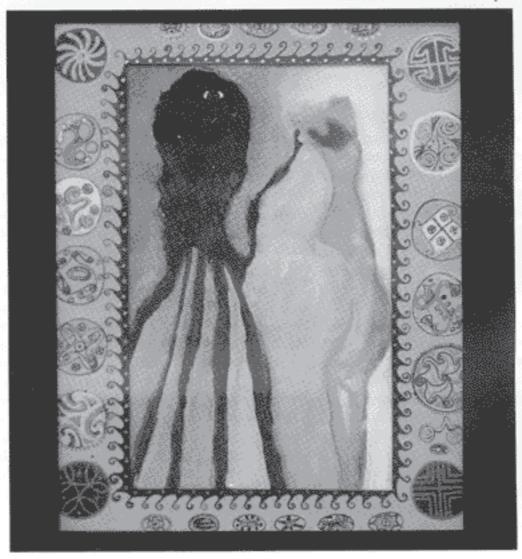
Martina's story confused me. Her works from Ireland made me laugh. This horrid, at the same time releasing laughter, that bears in you when you realize that somebody has ceased a phenomenon by the tail. What confused me was the toughness of the female conditions in the Irish art world, the toughness she had had to mobilize and develop to create and defend her artistic, female identity. In the total, catholic predominance, she found her way back in history, beyond the Christian era, to the Celtic culture. To a matriarchy where women went to war, where each year the queen whoed a young man who was killed to give place to his successor. No wonder the later culture wanted to revenge!

A journey in Nepal in 1997 brought direct contact with these incredible shapes, colours and symbols she knew without really knowing. The journey inspired her to a long series of paintings with the mandala as the leading motif. The circular shape represents completion, harmony, healing and eternity. "I painted such circles a long time ago", she remembers, " as an unconscious element of a larger body of work. I discovered this feature only in discussions with friends. Later I found the mandala was a symbol common to many cultures, from the Celts to the Japanese. It serves as a great unifier for the cultural migrant that I've become."

Suddenly, though, she found that her work was developing in a direction which started to borrow from aspects of religion and this evolution has brought her back to the west, through Dante's 'The Divine Comedy'. Hopefully we will soon have the occasion to see what she finds in the circles of Purgatory, Hell and Heaven.

Martina Cleary seems to have the power of those who have fought difficulties and overcome them. In her painting, she moves between the very precise patterns and carefully painted details, impressions of space and light, and strongly expressive, symbolistic imagery. She often frames her works with patterns from the old Celtic or Eastern ornamentary - to lift or 'separate' the painting from the rest of the world. Her earlier paintings have strong caricature features, and are thus related to her biting installations, where she seems to scrupulessly take issue with hypocritical elements of her catholic background. Recent works are less direct in meaning but aim to be more universal in content.

The Stoa Exhibition The Malmitalo Exhibition Election of the new Board

During the meeting the above items were discussed at length and the following decisions made.

The Stoa Exhibition

The exhibition at Stoa will be held from late August to late September 1999. The full Stoa gallery space will be made available to participants. The artists to show will be chosen by a jury of board memebers. All submissions made by the application deadline of April 15th will be reviewed and final decisions made during the next board meeting on May 16th. The catalogue to accompany this exhibition will be designed by a committee consisting of Martina Cleary, Sanna Karlsson, Keijo Sundvall and Amir Khatib. This group will work in cooperation with Stoas residant designer. Work on this catalogue will begin immediately. All participants in the exhibition are invited to contribute their ideas and facilitate the committee by providing materials requested to fill their allocated space in the publication.

The Malmitalo Exhibition

Following negotiations with Abdul Amir Khatib the director or Malmitalo has offered Eu Man the possibility to exhibit in October-November 1999. The gallery and larger balcony space in Malmitalo have been reserved for this event. Malmitalo has also offered to meet 50% of all costs involved in mounting this show. Participants in this exhibition will be selected following the review of the Stoa applications. Should the number of entrants for the first event be very large, the board may make a reserve list and offer the an exhibition time to those now chosen for Stoa, time to those not chosen for Stoa at Malmitalo instead.

The Board

Due to the growth of EU-MAN it has been unanimously decided that the board should be expanded and more centrolized. For the period May 1999-May 2000, the majority of board members have been chosen from those members resident in Helsinki. Now that the amount of administrative and practical work in the organisation has increased, with the expansion of EU-MANs activities, it is hoped that selecting a body of members who can maintain regular contact, may ease the burden on the founding members. 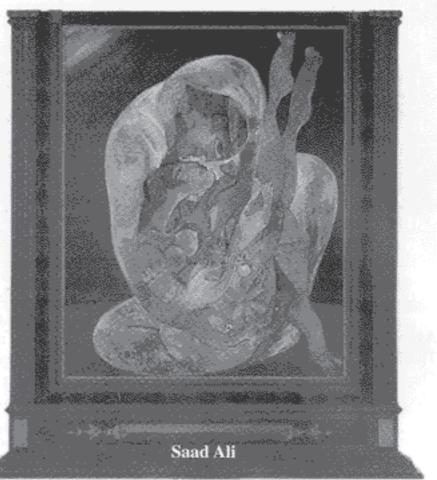
PRINCIE'S TRUST EUROPEAN PRO-GRAMME

European offers many opportunities and challenges. The Prince's Trust offers 2 types of grants, Go and See grants and Go and Help grants to individuals between 18 and 25 years (and in some cases up to 30 years of age) who are out of full time education and would not otherwise have the chance to travel. A Go and See grant is an opportunity to make links with counterparts across Europe. The grant provides the participant with an airline ticket and up to £ 350 to visit a potential partner and sort out how a project might work. This is a good way of preparing or follwing up a

youth exchnge. A Go and Help grant is an opportunity for those who need travel and pocket mony to enable them to spend time doing voluntary work in another European country (Summer mostly). Both grants are on offer to individuals rather than groups and cover the wider Europe, including Russia and Turkey. There are no deadlines and takes eight weeks for grants to be processed. Join 2,000 fellow artists, educators, scholars, writers, museum directors, curators, collectors, designers and architacts at Amsterdam's elegant RAI Conference Center on 13 July 1999, for the opening of Ceramic Millennium: Leadership Congress of the Ceramic Arts Foundation. 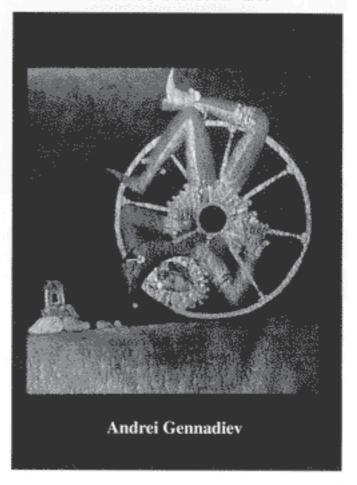

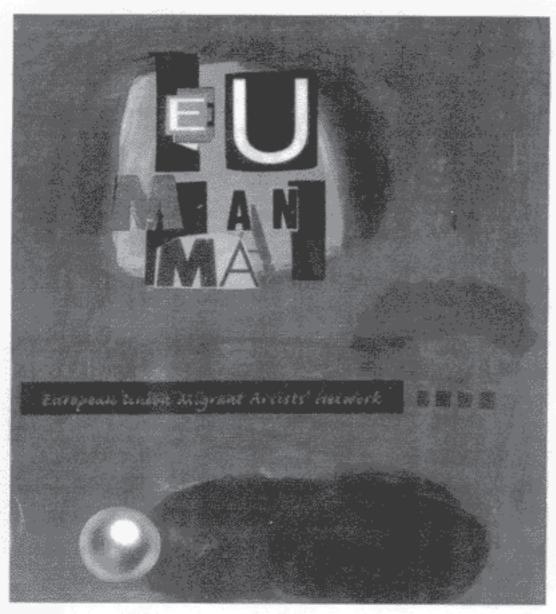

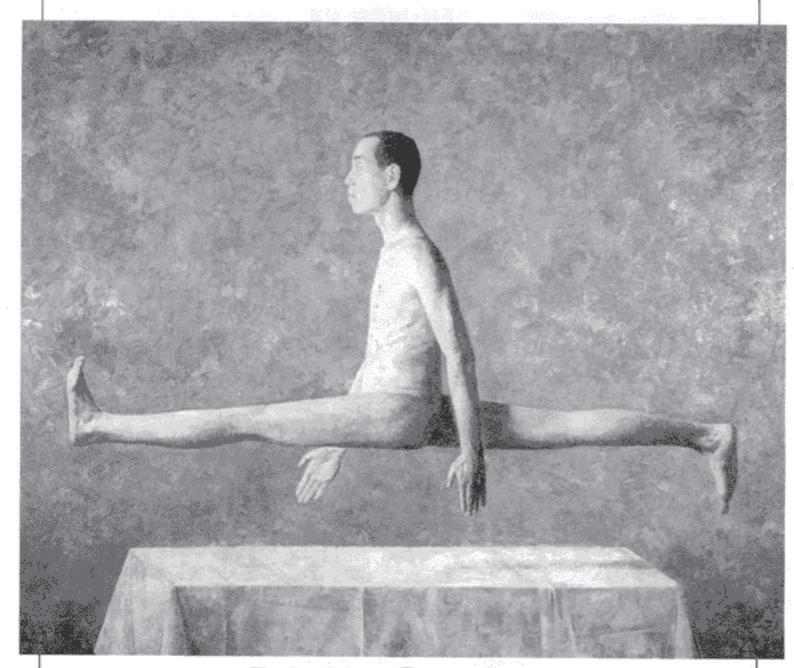
